## Proposed Bylaws Change Vote

Below are the proposed Bylaw amendments to provide for electronic meetings that will be voted on at the January business meeting.

<u>Article IX, Section 6</u>. Electronic Meetings. When circumstances prevent a physical meeting of the Affiliate Membership, an electronic meeting may be held. For business to be conducted, i.e. decisions made, at the electronic meeting, certain conditions must be met: 1) the meeting must provide for simultaneous aural communication of the participants; and 2) the technology used for the meeting must be available to all participants.

<u>Article X, Section 8</u>. Electronic Meetings. When circumstances prevent a physical meeting of the **Board of Directors**, an electronic meeting may be held. For business to be conducted, i.e. decisions made, at the electronic meeting certain conditions must be met: 1) the meeting must provide for simultaneous aural communication of the participants; and 2) the technology used for the meeting must be available to all participants.

<u>Article XI, Section 5</u>. Electronic Meetings. When circumstances prevent a physical meeting of the <u>Executive Committee</u>, an electronic meeting may be held. For business to be conducted, i.e. decisions made, at the electronic meeting, certain conditions must be met: 1) the meeting must provide for simultaneous aural communication of the participants; and 2) the technology used for the meeting must be available to all participants.

## "Global Warming: Can You Hear The Warning?" Dr. Joanne Logan, Guest Speaker



Joanne Logan hails from Boston, Massachusetts, so forgive her Yankee accent. She studied soil science at the University of Connecticut, followed by a threeyear stint as a soil scientist in Peace Corps Ecuador. She earned her advanced degrees in Applied Climatology from the Agency for International Development

(USAID) in the University of Nebraska, followed by a two-year assignment for the US Dominican Republic.

Since 1987, she has been a faculty member at the University of Tennessee, where she currently directs and teaches in the undergraduate program in Environmental and Soil Sciences. For many years, she taught the only Climate Change related course at UT; although, there are more of them now.

In 2007, she attended Al Gore's Climate Reality Project training in Nashville, providing her access to his amazing set of slides and the most recent data and reports related to climate change science. It is a subset of these that she will be presenting to this group.

Her research expertise includes climate change signals in rainfall and temperature patterns, impacts on crops and food security, as well as regenerative agriculture and its role in combatting climate change.

She also serves as an associate state climatologist, and is the current chair of the local group of the Sierra Club, where she is an environmental and social activist, with an emphasis on the climate crisis.

## Voting 2020

## Who Did Not Vote?

I know, I know...you are sick of the 2020 election and the data that goes with it. But now that it is over (It is over, isn't it?) some interesting facts have emerged. NPR and the Medill School of Journalism commissioned an external organization to conduct a survey of US adults who did not vote.

### So, Who Did Not Vote And Why?

More Americans voted in 2020 than any other presidential election in 120 years. About 67% of eligible voters cast their ballots this year, but that means a third did not. That amounts to about 80 million people. Nonvoters have several reasons for not voting according to the survey.

#### Nonvoter's reasons for not voting include:

- Not being registered to vote (29%)
- Not being interested in politics (23%)
- Not liking the candidates (20%)
- A feeling their vote would not have made a difference (16%)
- Being undecided for whom to vote (10%)

They feel disengaged, disaffected, and do not believe politics can make a difference in their lives. They are more likely to be Latino, younger, make less money and have lower levels of education than voters.

Nonvoters also mostly shunned news of the presidential election. They were far less likely to have watched the debates or conventions. Fewer than a third watched the presidential debates, compared to two-thirds of voters.

## What Would Motivate Them To Vote?

Not much, it seems, Asked what they think would encourage people to vote, the top answer was:

• None or Nothing (35%).

#### They Suggested These Motivators:

- Cleaning up government (27%)
- Having more candidates to choose from (20%)
- Being automatically registered to vote (16%) (I am not sure what this meant in the survey.)\*
- Making Election Day a national holiday (15%).

#### Incidentally

• Making Election Day a national holiday was the top answer for voters (42%).

Voter education is more important than ever. Just because the 2020 election is past does not mean our work is done. Clearly, as AAUW members, our work in voter education is ahead of us in 2021 and beyond.
